This December issue includes a new section entitled "Sociological Briefings" with the aim to disseminate to society the sociological contributions that can be of interest for very diverse stakeholders, ISA members, and society at large. On this occasion, *e-Symposium* includes sociological briefings on two topics of the public debates: COVID-19 and gender violence. the pivotal role played by informal trading in the process of meeting the needs of the people. It is a mainstay process that deserves adequate recognition till distributive-inclusive development reaches its full potential in developing countries.

The two final contributions are sociological briefings that summarize the findings of the contributions "Conclusions: Towards a sociology of pandemics and beyond" and "The Concept and the Name of Isolating Gender Violence", the first one being published in *Current Sociology*. The dissemination of the main messages of both academic works is aimed at diverse audiences and will spread knowledge created in the sociological field in these two topics.

As in previous issues, I would like to invite sociologists from all over the world and in different stages of their careers, to send their proposals for publication in *e-Symposium*. If you have proposals, suggestions, works in progress or other ideas, do not hesitate to share them with me and I will be very pleased to provide feedback.
